"Uh, if he was trying to get away, it would have been a lot different. He would have been trying to do a pushup type position, but he clearly had his hands by his waistband."

Did you say that to the officers in the morning of the 1st?

- A. Yes, I did.
- Q. So you, in fact, saw his hands go to his waistband, true?
 - A. No, not true.
- Q. You never saw Mr. Grant's hands going for his waistband?
- A. His arms were here. I made the assumption that his hands are in extension of his arms. And since his arms were in this fashion, that his hands were at his waistband.
- Q. Well, I know that if Mr. Grant is laying down and he's laying on his hands, you or no one else is going to be able to see them, right?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. But what I'm trying to get from you, sir, is whether or not he made a motion with his arms or his hands that led you to believe that his hands were going for his waistband.
 - A. No, he did not.
 - Q. He never made a motion that led you to believe that?
- A. I never saw his hands disappear. I just saw his arms in that fashion.
- Q. Yet you told the officers the morning of this incident that he clearly had his hands by his waistband?

- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. But you're saying here now that he never did anything that led you to believe his hands were going for his waistband?
 - A. I don't remember saying that.
 - Q. Okay. Can you turn to page 27 of that transcript?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Line number one. This is the first transcript. You have the first transcript there, sir?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Can you turn to page 27?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. I want to start at line nine where you say the following:

"Yeah. For -- for me, based on my experience in wrestling or fighting with people who are, uh, resisting or trying to flee, generally speaking, they put their hands in their chest area or outside the chest area in a pushup type position in an attempt to get away or get up. This, uh, this individual did nothing of the sort. As a matter of fact, he put his hands, both hands, into his waistband, if not down into the groin area, and that's generally where weapons are kept. And that's where our concern was."

Did you say that to the investigators the morning of the 1st?

- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And so when Oscar Grant put his hands to his groin area, you believed that at that time he was going for a weapon,

true?

- A. I don't remember saying that.
- Q. Okay. Does it refresh your memory to read what I just read? Does that refresh your memory at all?
 - A. Yes. Yes, it does.
- Q. And so did you tell the investigators that Oscar Grant was using his hands to go towards his waistband, specifically his groin area, and that that in fact posed an imminent threat of death to you?
- A. Well, it says that I said, "And that's generally where weapons are kept, and that's where our concern was."
- Q. So when Oscar Grant did that, you had that concern, true?
- A. When I saw his elbows, like I said, in a fashion to where it appeared that his hands were at his waistband, yes.
 - Q. Yes what?
- A. That's where my concern is, his hands are at his waistband or groin area.
- Q. And you believe that if his hands are going towards his waistband, where you believe oftentimes people carry weapons, you at that time felt that he, Mr. Grant, posed an imminent threat of death to you, correct?
 - A. To all of us.
 - Q. Including yourself?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And that was your mindset when you saw his hands going for his waistband, right?
 - A. Again, I never saw his hands going for his waistband.

- Q. You believed at that time that it's possible this guy has a gun under there and he could pull it on us, possibly shoot someone, true?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Now, when you saw that and you believed that he could be going for a gun and you felt that you were in imminent threat of death or great bodily injury or maybe your fellow officers were, why didn't you pull your gun?
- A. I had more control over his body without my gun in my hand than I would have if I pulled my gun out.
 - Q. So you didn't want to occupy your hands?
 - A. That's correct.
- Q. Now, were you concerned that possibly he could break free, turn around and pull a gun on you?
 - A. Was I concerned for that?
 - Q. Yes.
 - A. Is that the question, sir?
 - Q. Yes. At that time, was that going through your mind?
 - A. No, because I had control of his upper body, sir.
- Q. But you said he was squirming. In fact, I think you said just before the shot went off, he had broken free.
 - A. I don't think I said just before the shot, sir.
 - Q. When did he break free?
 - A. During the initial takedown.
- Q. Okay. Didn't you say that he broke free and that's what caused you to then turn and put your back towards the north end of the platform?
 - A. Yes, sir.

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- Ο. That's just right before the shot went off, right?
- Α. I don't know.
- Okay. See, I'm starting here on frame 2095, and I'm Q. going to play it. I'm going to stop it. I think it's going to show you turning your back to the north end of the platform.

(Video played.)

- Α. Right there. He just wiggled free.
- I'm going to go back. You tell me to stop. Okay. Can you see that or are you just doing that based on your independent recollection?
- You can see his head come up from underneath my leq. So I could not have possibly been putting 250 pounds of weight on his body if he was able to squirm free like that.
- Q. You tell me where you see him squirming free. qoing backwards and then I'm going to go forwards frame by frame, and you tell me when. Here we see you having your hand on the chest of Mr. Bryson?
 - Α. Yes.
 - Q. You look down.
 - And it's because he's squirming free right there. Α.
- Okay. And that's based on your independent 0. recollection or is there something you're seeing in this image?
 - Α. I'm looking at his head. It's down by my shin now.
 - Q. Down by your shoe?
- Shin area, I'm guessing. The video is kind of Α. blurry.
- It is. So now you're turning your back towards the north end of the platform; is that right?

- A. That's correct.
- Q. And my question is: This is the time when he breaks free; is that correct?
 - A. He already broke free.
- Q. So at this point in time at frame 2392, is he free or have you regained control of him?
- A. I believe I've got control over him at this time, sir.
- Q. And in this frame 2420, you can see your hand is clearly on the back of his head pushing down, correct?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Now, is it at this time that his hands are going for his waistband and you are in imminent fear of death?
 - A. I don't remember.
- Q. Now, when Mr. Mehserle said for you to get up, you were holding Mr. Grant. And although you were in imminent fear of death, you felt it was better for you to not pull your gun, in other words, use lethal force or the threat of lethal force, to combat the lethal force that was being thrust upon you; is that correct?
 - A. I don't understand. Where is the lethal thrust?
 - O. The lethal force.
 - A. The lethal force, where is that?
- Q. Well, if you think Oscar Grant is going for his groin area or his waistband; you think there's a high probability that maybe he's got a gun; you've testified already that that's what you thought he was doing; I would think that you would want to combat that threat because that's lethal force being put upon
